OWFC Business Code of Conduct / Annual Subs

A new season is upon us . With a further influx of juniors and schoolboys , plus training and a couple of teams playing through the summer. Our hopes are high. We have 7 teams on Saturday & the Vets on Sundays playing league football . Supervets will continue to play friendlies on Sundays.

We have kept annual subs for 21s & over in employment to £150 & under 21s in employment £75, both pay £10 weekly subs . If you are playing 4 or less games you will pay £20 match fees , but no annual subs. Junior members paying annual subs to the junior section & schoolboys pay no annual subs but pay £5 weekly subs. Vets due to the number of games pay annual subs , Supervets pay £50 annual subs & £10 per game match .

Unemployed please chat to your skipper or Stu Dunk (treasurer or me (asst treasurer) and we will agree something that is workable for you as we want you to play . Annual subs are due on 30th September 2025 . We are using Pitchero & you should have an email to confirm your details, receive newsletters , about events also paying your annual subs or outstanding fines like yellow and red cards.

Why the rise in annual subs ? our rent to the association has gone up by 7.5% this season taking it above £24,000 per annum . The reason is ground maintenance (looking after both hayes & Hawesdown) costs £71,000 per year (up from £60,000 last season due mainly to the extra cost of running Hawesdown), utilities has gone from £21,000 in 2021 to over £54,000 in 2025. So it is important you pay your annual subs on time as we look to break even. Its also important you support events not only so you meet players from other teams but also have some fun & hopefully we make a bit of money , which will hopefully keep your annual subs as low as possible Also find a code of conduct we expect all our member to follow. Please read them as this is the minimum we expect as a club. Here's to a great season , good luck & enjoy

Code of Conduct

As a representative of the Old Wilsonians Football Club, I agree that;

On and off the pitch, I will:

- Always play the game fairly and in the right spirit.
- Be aware of the impact of bad language; keep spectators and members of the public - including children - in mind.
- Never verbally abuse a match official, player or spectator based their appearance, race, religion, gender or sexuality. Doing so could lead to dismissal from the field, suspension and possible police action.
- Never physically assault a match official, player or spectator. Doing so could lead to dismissal from the field, suspension and possible police action.
- Help to create a safe and inclusive environment both on and off the pitch.
- Report all allegations of abuse or poor practice to the Club Welfare Officer.
- Not to abuse, neglect, harm or discriminate against anyone; or act in a way that may be interpreted as such.
- Adhere to the club's safeguarding policy, rules and regulations.
- Attend the match with correct kit, this includes black shorts and gold socks.
- Arrive on time. If for any reason I may be late, I will inform my captain as soon as possible.
- Respect the decisions made by my captain.
- Not drop out from the game at short notice. This is unfair to other players who may have been left out, so that I could play. If I have a valid reason, I will inform my captain. Failure to contact my captain will result in being reported to the disciplinary committee.

Selection, finances and expected conduct.

- I understand, if I have made myself available to play, I will be expected to represent any team within the Old Wilsonians football club, as per rule 11 of the OWFC rules.
- I will sign up to the FA Matchday app.
- I will pay my annual and weekly subs on time. If I am unable to do this, I will inform the club treasurer who may be able to assist.
- I will conduct myself in such a manner as not to bring the Old Wilsonians football club into disrepute.
- I will not be involved with/under the influence of any drugs or illegal substances whilst representing the football club, in line with the OWFC drugs policy.
- When playing at home, I will help when required to offer hospitality to the visiting teams and complete requested duties.
- I understand the expectation that I support the club with fundraising events and activities.
- I understand that I need to provide the club with any personal data required for registration and/or safeguarding purposes.
- I will refrain from any criminal activity. I will represent the club with integrity and honesty.

I understand: If I do not follow the Code, I may expect to:

- Be cautioned, sin binned or sent off by the match officials, depending on the nature of the offence.
 - Be asked to apologize to whoever I have offended or abused.
 - Be disciplined by my club via the disciplinary committee, including being substituted, dropped, given a formal warning, suspended from training or matches or a permanent suspension from the club. This will depend on the nature of the offence.
 - Be disciplined by the County Football Association, including being fined or suspended for a number of matches depending on the nature of the offence.
 - Be handed a permanent exclusion by the FA or County Football Association if the offence is deemed serious enough.
- Declaration: I agree to abide by the conditions above and follow any guidance or policy as set out by Old Wilsonians football club, The AFA (County FA) or the Football Association.

West Wickham 0 v OWFC 1st XI 2

There are many ways to prepare for the first game of a new season. You can arrive early, stretch properly, have a sensible pre-match meal, mentally prepare yourself for 90 minutes of football and generally behave like a professional.

Or, if you're Monte Henry, you can turn up with the entire team kit while simultaneously announcing that you aren't actually playing.

Quite how this particular logistical masterpiece came about remains unclear, but there was a sizeable kerfuffle before kick-off as Monte arrived with the kit and the sort of air of a man who had absolutely no intention of putting it on. Whether this was tactical genius, administrative incompetence or simply Monte being Monte is still under investigation.

Eventually, however, attention turned to the actual football as we travelled to West Wickham for our first game of the season.

The pitch, it must be said, was absolutely magnificent.

Josh Eves was excellent down the wing, repeatedly causing problems and putting himself about in every challenge. He worked brilliantly to create the opening, clipping a lovely ball into the box for Marley Quashie.

Marley took a touch, composed himself and fired the ball into the bottom corner.

1–0.

A really good goal and a deserved reward for the pressure we'd been building.

Josh deserves plenty of credit for the assist, but the finish from Marley was exactly what you want from your forward — one touch, head up, bottom corner across goal, job done.

West Wickham tried to respond, but defensively we looked very comfortable. Fitz was outstanding on his debut, winning pretty much everything that came anywhere near him. Balls into the box? Won. Physical battles? Won. Headers? Won. Anything vaguely resembling a 50/50? Also won.

At this point, it became apparent that Joe Fitz had apparently spent the summer preparing for the sole purpose of ruining opposing forwards' afternoons.

The rest of the back line followed suit and looked solid throughout, restricting Wickham to very little and ensuring Kaya had relatively little to do beyond occasionally lying down and complaining about his leg.

We went into half-time 1–0 up, and, considering this was our first game of the season, we were relatively pleased with the performance.

There were certainly things to improve, but the foundations were there. We looked organised, competitive and, **most importantly, we had the lead.**

The second half began with more of the same, and eventually Sam Forbes produced a moment of quality, slipping a perfectly weighted ball through to the returning Monte Henry.

Remember Monte?

The man who arrived with the kit while insisting he wasn't playing?

Well, apparently he was.

And he wasn't just playing. He was scoring.

Monte found himself through behind the Wickham back line and calmly slotted the ball home to make it 2–0.

A remarkable turnaround for a man who, not long earlier, seemed to be attending the match purely in a logistical capacity.

The second goal gave us even more confidence, and we continued to look comfortable at the back. Fitz continued his excellent debut, winning everything and looking like he'd been playing with the lads for years.

There was also a particularly amusing moment following an offside decision from an attacking free kick.

With Wickham looking to restart quickly, Sam James decided that the best way to give himself and his defenders a few extra seconds ~~to get back into position was to~~ cheekily kick the ball away over the crossbar.

There were strong performances throughout the side, particularly defensively, with the back line looking organised and resilient for the full 90 minutes.

Teddy Farmer caused Wickham defence murders giving both centre backs torrid days at the office.

Josh Eves deserves a special mention as well. He was unbelievable throughout, biting into every challenge, constantly beating his man to the ball. He looked like someone who had been personally offended by the existence of West Wickham's winger.

And then there was Joe Fitz.

An absolutely excellent debut.

He won everything, looked composed and helped set the tone for what was a very strong defensive performance. A clean sheet on debut and a thoroughly deserved Man of the Match award.

Probably still winning headers somewhere as this report is being written.
